

#### About **PGPDM**

The PGPDM is a 12-month modular programme designed for professionals working in, or intending to work in, the social sector, including NGOs, foundations, CSR functions of corporates or forprofit organisations, social policy or welfare departments of governments, and social enterprises.

Case studies, application exercises, and field-based assignments and projects ensure that classroom learning is applied to real-life situations.


#### Feasible for working professionals


#### **Development Management Project**



## Programme architecture & contact's overview



- 'Contact' refers to the 'contact days' when classes or sessions are held. These sessions include physical or online classes, depending on the type of contact.
- There are a total of six contacts for the entire duration of the programme, with each term divided into two contacts.
- A seven to nine week gap exists between two contacts, which is used to complete readings, application exercises, field assignments, group work, and examinations.
- For three contacts, students must come to SPJIMR's Mumbai campus, while the remaining three contacts are held online.
- For online contacts, sessions take place after lunch on weekdays and all day on Sundays.
- Contact durations vary from 13 to 16 days; total contact days amount to approximately 90, with around 400 contact hours.
- The contacts and examinations calendar for the entire year is provided to the students before admission to help them plan their studies, professional commitments and personal life.

## Faculty profile


Thirty-two top-tier faculty members from SPJIMR, including both core and adjunct faculty, are joined by visiting experts from outside the institution.

They offer a balanced approach in the classroom, blending theory and practice with management and development expertise to enrich the learning experience.










## **Application process**



Sponsored candidates must submit a letter of support from their organisation



Applicants must complete the online application form on the SPJIMR PGPDM portal after reviewing the brochure

An application processing fee of Rs. 1,000 is required

## Important information

- Selected candidates must present original documents (education, experience, ID, address, income in case of scholarship recipients, etc.)
- Discrepancies between application information and documents may result in admission cancellation without a refund
- Communication will be sent only to shortlisted and selected candidates
- Selected candidates must secure support from their organisation due to the programme's intensive nature

### **Selection process**



Shortlisting is based on the profile and application details



Shortlisted candidates will undergo an online interview with SPJIMR faculty



Final selection is based on interview performance

### Programme fee

I. Corporate/international NGO-sponsored and highincome candidates

Rs. 3,00,000 + GST

#### Payment options

- 1. Full payment of Rs. 3,00,000 + GST
- 2. Term-wise: Rs. 1,00,000 + GST per term (x 3 terms)

#### II. NGO or self-sponsored candidates

Rs. 1,50,000 + GST

#### Payment options

- 1. Full payment of Rs. 1,50,000 + GST
- 2. Term-wise: Rs. 50,000 + GST per term (x 3 terms)
- 3. Instalments: Six equal instalments of Rs. 25,000 + GST before start of every contact. First instalment required for admission confirmation. Post-dated cheques for the remaining 5 instalments to be submitted on reporting day.

#### III. Discount in fee

Rs. 10,000 concession per candidate for two or more participants from the same NGO.

Limited scholarships available for low-income deserving candidates.

## **Accommodation policy**

Selected candidates are required to reside together in the SPJIMR hostel in Mumbai campus or in the programme-arranged accommodation during on-campus sessions. This facilitates peer learning, community building, and ensures complete dedication to the programme. It is compulsory for students to reside in the hostel for on-campus sessions. Accommodation and food costs are subsidised but must be covered by the students.
